Message From The President

Busy, busy May 2014, Wow! First, we participated in the Riverkeeper's Riversweep. The area where we decided to help out was the Hudson riverfront at the Annsville Preserve Park. It felt really good to clean up the refuse and leave the riverfront a better place. I enjoyed the view of the Annsville Creek between the railroad bridge and Rte. 9 bridge. Thank you Bill Flank, Gunnar Andersen (and myself) for volunteering, and a special thanks to Daria Gregg for coordinating the Peekskill waterfront area effort.

For our monthly Potluck we screened *'Til The River Runs Clear*. This film is a wonderful tribute to Pete Seeger and the Clearwater. At the end of the film Pete Seeger says, "I feel like the old grandpa now in more ways than one. I see young musicians doing what I tried to do. The young people learning to sail as I learned to sail. I think, but I'm not sure, this campaign is going to go on and on until the water is Clear!"

The next week we went on the FRoGS-sponsored tour of the Great Swamp. They had 5 rescue kayakers stationed along the route. These kayakers also asked everyone a trivia question about the swamp. It was a magical experience seeing the budding trees, beaver lodges, turtles basking, various water birds including a swan, and redwing blackbirds. My favorite was after the Rte. 22 bridge, when the current picked up noticeably, and my kayak swung around all the tight turns. (There was a very heavy rain the day before.)

Arriving at the Green Chimneys take-out we were treated to a live band, and a light meal was provided to the kayakers. This was a 7-mile one-way trip—a nice challenge.

The Westchester County Earth Day celebration at Croton Point Park was a great success, with people of all ages learning about our activities, and what the Riverlovers stand for. We have gathered quite a list of e-mail addresses and phone numbers, to notify people of our future activities

On Monday, May 26th at 5pm (instead of May 31st), we are again having an opportunity to tour Wildflower Island, at the Teatown Reservation. This tour was very successful last year and was sold out. The date was changed due to concerns that the wildflowers might be past their peak.

The Clearwater Revival Festival will be held on the weekend of June 21-22, which is the week after Fathers' Day. The Friday June 20th Potluck will also be a volunteer sign-up for duty hours. For Saturday we need volunteers for the Riverlovers outreach table (four of the volunteers can

If anyone is interested in a Constitution Marsh canoe trip guided by the Audubon Society, let me know and we will inquire about it. We have done this several times in the past, and it is an interesting, educational and enjoyable trip.

For the September 19th Potluck we will screen a PBS program about Rachel Carson's *Silent Spring*. She wrote an expose' of the chemical industry and its unregulated use of DDT in 1962, and her warning sparked a revolution in environmental policy. Also in Autumn, we will screen other PBS specials including the increasingly relevant *Antarctica Challenge—Global Warming*, and *Car of the Future*.

A Tribute to Pete Seeger

We lost a great man. A really great man!

Among the many activities in his life he co-founded our parent environmental organization, the Hudson River Sloop Clearwater, in 1966. According to our late Terry Arnold, "We started Clearwater and Riverlovers in my living room."

My own experience with Pete was when he attended one of the Riverlovers ShadFests. I was showing attendees the sunspots on the Sun with my telescope that was fitted with a solar filter. I was thrilled to show Pete that we could look right at the Sun. I explained that normally I view the stars and planets on clear nights, and I showed him my various star charts and astronomy maps. Always thinking about the children, he remarked that there should be children's books for astronomy too.

We were honored that he met up with our last Clearwater sail in August of 2013, as we disembarked in Beacon. Pete was waiting at the dock, and we all had a few words with him. My wife Bruni gave him a hug.

President Barack Obama notes that Seeger had been called "America's Tuning Fork" and that he believed in the power of song to bring social change. "Over the years, Pete used his voice and his hammer—to strike blows for workers' rights, and civil rights; world peace and environmental conservation; and he always invited us to sing along. For reminding us where we came from and showing us where we need to go, we will always be grateful to Pete Seeger."

Who's At Risk From Climate Change?

In case you're wondering, here's how climate change will affect different regions of the country.

Northeast: Communities are affected by heat waves, more extreme precipitation events, and coastal flooding due to sea level rise and storm surges.

Southeast and Caribbean: Decreased water availability, exacerbated by population growth and land use changes, cause increased competition for water. There are increased risks associated with extreme events such as hurricanes.

Midwest: Longer growing seasons and rising carbon dioxide levels increase yields of some crops, although these benefits have already been offset in some instances by occurrence of extreme weather events such as heat waves, droughts and floods.

Great Plains: Rising temperatures lead to increased demand for water and energy, and impacts on agricultural practices.

Southwest: Drought and increased warming foster wildfires and increased competition for scarce water resources for people and ecosystems.

Northwest: Changes in the timing of streamflows related to earlier winter snowmelt reduce the supply of water in summer, causing far-reaching ecological and socioeconomic consequences.

Alaska: Rapidly receding summer sea ice, receding glaciers, and thawing permafrost cause damage to infrastructure and major changes to ecosystems. Impacts to Alaska Native communities increase.

Hawaii and Pacific Islands: Increasingly constrained freshwater supplies, coupled with increased temperatures,

stress both people and ecosystems, and decrease food and water security.

Coasts: Coastal lifelines, such as water supply infrastructure and evacuation routes, are increasingly vulnerable to higher sea levels and storm surges, inland flooding and other climate-related changes.

Oceans: The oceans are currently absorbing about a quarter of human-caused carbon dioxide emissions to the atmosphere and over 90% of the heat associated with global warming, leading to ocean acidification and the alteration of marine ecosystems. Phytoplankton, the basis of the worldwide food web, is significantly disrupted.

While the planet will survive, we, and other life forms, may not fare so well. Right now, we're just passively watching it happen.

Landmark Fracking Ruling

A jury ruled last month that a Texas family claiming they were sickened because of pollution from hydraulic fracturing operations near their home should be awarded \$3 million for their troubles. Aruba Petroleum was sued in 2011, alleging the oil and gas producer exposed them to hazardous gases, chemicals and industrial waste that seeped into the air from 22 wells drilled near the family's 40-acre plot of land, which sits atop the Barnett Shale formation.

According to the complaint, the family began experiencing symptoms like chronic nose bleeding, irregular heartbeat, muscle spasms, and open sores. Testing showed drilling chemicals in blood and lung samples that match chemicals detected by the state in air testing outside the family's home.

The jury returned a 5-1 verdict saying Aruba "intentionally created a private nuisance," awarding \$275,000 for losses on property value, \$2 million for past physical pain and suffering, \$250,000 for future physical pain and suffering, and \$400,000 for mental anguish.

Aruba issued a statement saying "The facts of the case and the law as applied to those facts do not support the verdict. Aruba is an experienced oil and gas operator that is in compliance within the air quality limits set by the Texas Railroad Commission and the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality."

The decision is being hailed as the first jury verdict in a fracking case to date. This is because fracking companies have largely been able to dodge injury lawsuits over their operations.

A lot of the earlier tort cases against fracking companies were dismissed because the industry was so successful at withholding information that people couldn't draw connections between the problems they had and what industry was doing. Plaintiffs are unable to prove that the oil or gas extraction process was the actual cause of injury. But now studies are starting to be done, and people are beginning to realize that they can document the impacts.

As more and more studies are showing, horizontal fracturing, or fracking, is responsible for health damage, drinking water and groundwater contamination, earthquake damage, increased rail accidents, increased greenhouse gas emissions, and the list goes on. Who said this was such a great idea?

"It Must Be True—It's On The Internet"

When you look for information, the Internet is often one of the first places you go to. No matter what keywords or phrases you use, a flood of results usually comes up. Suddenly you've gone from not having enough information to having too much. How do you drink from this fire hose and find accurate, reliable information? Here's some guidelines.

Source: Who published the information? Who is paying to make it available? Does the source have an agenda or a reason to post information that is not totally objective? Is the site supported by advertisements, and if so, might the advertiser have had reason to slant the material one way or the other? Do you have to pay for the information, and does that buy you some degree of quality control?

Author: Who is the author? Is there contact information? With what institutions or organizations is the author associated? What's their reputation, expertise, or credentials in this subject? Is the material anonymous? Why might it be?

Peer Review: Has the article or the site been reviewed by other experts in the field? Are there references or links to high-quality supporting information? Is it referenced by other sources considered reputable? Has it been carefully edited, and is it free of typos and inconsistencies?

Verification: Can you independently confirm the information? Are the assumptions listed? Are fact and opinion clearly distinguished? Does it agree with other sources, and

pass the "sense" test? Is the presentation balanced, rather than one-sided or slanted?

Timeliness: When was the information published, and last updated? Is it still relevant? Is the site reliable—is the information still there a day or a week later?

If you can say the information meets these criteria with flying colors, then maybe it just might be true. Otherwise, it's "buyer beware" and "take it with a grain of salt."


